



Woodside retires after 30 Years with CPS

Steven Woodside retired this year after giving more than 30 years of his life to Columbus Public Schools (CPS) as a teacher, assistant principal and building principal.

Woodside moved to Columbus in 1989 and got his first job with CPS as a skilled and technical sciences teacher at Columbus High School (CHS). He would serve in this position for 14 years, before deciding he wanted a change.

"Midway through my teaching career in Columbus, I was fortunate to have participated in a diverse set of experiences that broadened my understanding and scope of education," he said. "I was reaching the point in my career where I wanted a challenge and the opportunity to influence education beyond just my classroom."

Woodside became CHS assistant principal in 2003, before becoming building principal in 2009 – a position he held until his retirement.

Throughout his time with CPS, Woodside has emphasized career and college readiness for students.

As a skilled and technical sciences teacher in 1995, Woodside worked with Tracy Dodson from CHS and Leon Finecy from Central Community College (CCC) to merge CPS' and CCC's machine tool programs to become the 2+2 Machine Tool Technology program. At the time, it was the first manufacturing program of its kind in Nebraska.

In 1998, CHS was one of five schools nationally selected as a pilot site for the Building Linkages Advanced Manufacturing project. This was a four-year curriculum designed for students interested in a





career in manufacturing. Woodside served as co-chair on the project which was recognized for its efforts to bring industry-based standards into the statewide, school-to-career movement.

In his ten years as building principal, Woodside has helped CHS continue this focus on career, as well as, college readiness. Students now have the opportunity to earn college credit from a total of 83 credit offerings from CCC and 22 credits from Nebraska Wesleyan University. CHS students can earn career certifications for positions such as industrial manufacturing technicians, certified nursing assistants and more as well as in the business area.

"Students today need to be explicitly shown the rationale and application of what they are learning in the classroom," Woodside said. "Translating lessons learned to real life and career-based examples captures and retains students' attention."

With this goal in mind, Woodside has also helped promote science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) programs at CHS that will prepare students for technical careers that are in high demand in Columbus.

"This is achieved through meaningful and real-world learning experiences," he said. "Integration of math, science and engineering principles are embedded into the students' learning experiences in the STEM wing of the high school."

Being involved with the creation of the 2+2 Machine Tool program and STEM program, were some of the highlights of Woodside's career.

But Woodside's favorite part of his career as building principal was moving CHS into its new home at 3434 Discoverer Drive in 2017.

"The move and start-up of the high school during the school year truly demonstrated the quality of teamwork, collaboration, hard work and spirit that makes being a Discoverer so rewarding and special," he said.

Woodside said he doesn't know of many high schools that would be able to transition from one location to another between terms without missing a beat instructionally. He said this move was possible because of the cooperation and patience of the students and the hard work of staff who give their all to students every day.

"Day-in and day-out, our certificated and classified staff give it their best effort and really do care about each other and our students," he said. "Columbus Public School and CHS do want the best for our kids, and the commitment they have to providing programs to reach ALL kids is second to none."

Woodside will miss these dedicated coworkers in retirement.

"The people and the personal and the professional relationships and bonds formed over the years are what I will miss most," he said.







Kramer Education Center



Since January 2019, you may have been hearing about changes taking place to the former Kramer High School & Columbus Middle School. After waiting over a year to determine next steps with the property, the Columbus Board of Education (BOE) approved the demolition of the south side of the building that could not be salvaged. These changes are due to the BOE's vision to provide a community based early childhood education center and administrative office space. Specifically, to provide space to accommodate more preschool opportunities for children age 4.

Phase 1: Removal of the decorative stone pieces and cornerstone of the building.

Phase 2: Demolition of the 1924 building and 1955, 1965, and 1988 additions, on the south side of the structure.

Phase 3: Assess community early childhood needs.

Phase 4: Develop building design and programming of the early childhood education center.

Currently we are in Phase 3: assessing the needs of the community. Not only for early childhood education but for daycare and other family services as well. CPS has partnered with Communities for Kids to survey community members, daycare providers and businesses regarding local needs.

CPS expands with summer enrichment program

STEM on the GO! offers students in 3rd through grade 6 exciting, hand-on, experiential science and STEM programs to supplement lessons in the classrooms and during summer break. During the school year the STEM trailer travels to each of our elementary schools in two-week increments. During that time teachers can pull bins with complete lessons and materials for use in their classrooms. Outside groups can also use the lessons from the STEM on the GO! Trailer for a minimal per student cost that is put toward material replacement.

This summer CPS expanded to summer break, by offering in July, four enrichment camps for Columbus area youth. This past July we had over 85 Columbus area youth participate.

4th Grade Modules

Bubble Bonanza! Youth explored how bubbles behave and investigate the properties of different materials to engineer the ultimate bubble wand.

The Sky's the Limit! Youth dove into aeronautical engineering by designing models of flying technologies that help NASA collect aerial photographs.

Light Up the Night Sky! Youth experimented with circuits and sculpting materials and design a light display that replicates the Northern Lights.

5th Grade Modules

Lift Off! Youth engineered prototype rockets and rovers to explore planets and moons in our solar system.

Go Green! Youth explored the properties of a race car to design the ultimate racers made entirely of recycled materials.

To the Rescue! In this module, youth worked through the scenario of severe flooding that has cut people off from important supplies. They engineered "air drop packages" that can be dropped from an aircraft, protect what's inside, and are easy to find once they reach the ground.

6-8th Grade Modules

High Tech Fashion- Youth designed wearable light up duct tape

clothing. They worked with basic circuit methodology while infusing their designs with creativity and innovation.

Marble Madness- Local youth used their ingenuity and learned to work with basic tools to create the ultimate complex marble run while meeting specific design requirements.

Toy Automata – Youth brought old broken toys, took them apart and explored how they worked. They then designed a new toy using the old toy parts and combined them with cams, levers, linkages and cranks.

Kitchen Detectives – Code breakers meets Escape Room meets Scavenger Hunt! The youth used cryptology, math and their puzzle solving skills to decipher a cake recipe written in code. When they got it right they enjoyed their yummy treat.

7-9th Grade Module

Vex Robotics – Youth started building with VEX on day one and learned the mechanics to construct their robots. They then programmed the robot to complete a challenge using a remote control
