New Foundation Director Seeks to connect alumni with CPS Foundation

Nicole Anderson became Columbus Public Schools' marketing/ foundation director in January. But

she's not new to the district. Anderson graduated from Columbus High School in 1999, and one of her main goals is to connect more alumni like herself to the Columbus Public Schools (CPS) Foundation and the school district.

"I believe that as alumni, our connection to Columbus High School, Kramer High School and Columbus Public Schools doesn't end at graduation," she said. "The CPS Foundation is just one way that we, as alumni and community members, can each anchor our legacy in Columbus Public Schools."

As marketing/foundation director, Anderson's work is split between the district and the foundation. In this new position, which was created by the CPS Board of Education in September, Anderson is in charge of managing donations to the CPS Foundation, as well as promoting the district.

This position allows for a lot of variety. For example, in her first few months on the job, Anderson has built a website for the CPS Foundation, launched an #ILovePublicSchools campaign and spearheaded the #BeDiscovererKind Challenge, a random acts of kindness challenge.

But, despite the variety of her job duties, there is one constant in Anderson's work.



"I get to be a part of telling the CPS story every day," she said. "There are so many great things happening in the school district that we want everyone to know about."

By telling the CPS story, Anderson hopes to further develop relationships between alumni and the school district and increase the percentage of alumni who support the CPS Foundation.

"The foundation is here to provide funding for those things that cannot be covered by district funding," she said. "And the things that we, as a group, can do to influence innovation and the future of this district are endless."

Anderson stressed that donations of all sizes make a difference in this mission.

"No amount is insignificant," she said. "Gifts large or small can truly make a difference to the education of CPS students."

To make it easier for alumni to connect with and donate to the CPS Foundation, the new foundation website now allows online giving.

This will help build on community interest in the CPS Foundation that Anderson said has been growing in recent years. She attributes this growth, in part, to new projects and innovations within the schools, such as the district's STEM program. Anderson said the CHS STEM Academy is a great example of the district's work to engage all learners and better connect students to area businesses and community members.

This relationship building is part of what drew Anderson to this position.

"My first impression of the CPS Foundation was – what an opportunity," she said. "The connections and relationships that the Foundation gets to build with students, staff, alumni and the community of Columbus makes this position very exciting."





Garrett breaks state pole vault record

CHS junior Jaidyn Garrett broke the state pole vault record, clearing 13 feet 3 1/4 inches on her second attempt. Her jump edged out Jenny Green of Grand Island Central Catholic who in 2003 set the record at 13 feet 3 inches, for the top spot on the all-time charts.

"It was a lot of fun," said Garrett. "We had a good tail wind, and it was a great competitive atmosphere. I just wanted to stay smooth down the runway and have fun."

"To have three girls over 12 feet, that never happens," Garrett added. "That motivates you to do better."

On her first attempt she easily made 12 feet 10 1/2 inches to take the Class A record, but she was determined to make even more history.

"As I was going down the runway, I remember thinking 'I can do this," Garrett said.

Last year, Garrett was edged out of the final season charts, however, she claimed the all-class gold medal at state in 2018 with her season best 12 feet 5 inches.

"I felt a lot more motivated coming into my junior year, and I wanted to show what I could do. My goal now is to be consistent over 13 feet."

Her father and coach, Pat Garrett said that the focus her freshman and sophomore years has been on her runway approach.

"This year we've done a lot more work on the pole and getting inverted, and she's taken it to another level," he said.

First state team trophy since 1989 Wrestling team finishes as State Runner Up

The 2019 CHS wrestling season is one that will be remembered for years to come. From winning another GNAC Championship, their 4th straight District Championship, winning the High Plains Invite and Norfolk Invite to qualifying 13 wrestlers for the state tournament, it has been a productive year.

In addition, the CHS team brought home the first state team trophy since 1989 finishing as State Runner-Up.

"By setting goals, then not being afraid to fully commit to achieving them, this senior class really showed that it is a formula for success," said CHS Head Coach Adam Keiswetter.

This season was full of highlights. CHS walked away with 8 state medalists, the most of any team at the 2019 State Tournament. Kasten Grape became a State Champion and will be the next added to the wall of champions. Avery McMeekin earned his first state medal finishing as state runner-up and Carter



Kucera finished his career with a win and brought home the 3rd place medal. CHS had 3 wrestlers place 4th: Tanner Kobza, Blayze Standley and Anthony DeAnda. Clay Cerny and Carson Zwingman each placed 5th. To top off the season, Carter Kucera made history as the winningest wrestler ever at CHS with 186 wins. Carson Zwingman broke the career pin record with 118 pins.

Keiswetter went on to say "This team is a group of dedicated wrestlers, and they have incredible work ethic. They put in hundreds of hours in their high school years lifting weights, drilling wrestling techniques and competing in far away places to test themselves."

"All of that was done in a way to achieve their individual goals, but also to help their teammates. They never went alone. They never lifted alone. They never wrestled alone. They always encouraged others to join them, and they became a focused group of athletes who were all doing it together. One of the wrestlers wrote in his goal sheet last year he wanted to create a brotherhood. That was something we spent time on building, and it really showed this year."

Next year the CHS team is looking to continue their pursuit of winning a state championship.

"Nothing really changes," Keiswetter said. "We will keep working hard year-round in our pursuit of helping each of the wrestlers achieve the goals they set for themselves, and we will welcome a new bunch into our brotherhood."

Foundation awards classroom grants

Lost Creek Speech and Language Pathologist Chelsea Werner received a \$400 classroom grant to purchase speech generating app that will be used district wide.

The apps will benefit students from birth to age 21.

This grant request was driven by the students in the CPS district who require an alternate mode to communicate with those around them. The funds will be used to purchase the Proloque2Go, Go Talk Now, and Snap + Core applications for students to use as a trial and potentially transition into everyday use.

The major objective of this project is to provide students with speech and language impairments the opportunities and tools to be successful communicators in the classroom. The three main objectives for this project include:

1. Given one year of progress monitoring and data collection conducted by the speech-language pathologist and teachers, students will trial various speech-generating applications to best determine which utility to be a functional communicator in the academic setting.

2. Given one year of progress monitoring and data collection conducted by the speech-language pathologist and teachers, the student will functionally communicate

with adults and peers around him/her, as measured by observations and specific goals set by the team for the specific student.

3.Given one year of progress monitoring and data collection conducted by the speech-language pathologist and teachers, the staff will determine the utility of the selected speech-generating applications through trials of each application for at least one month for the student. A device will be selected to move forward for purchase with the assistance of their team, including the speech language pathologist, teacher, resource teacher, parents and insurance provider.

CHS Physical Education and Health teacher Stacy Smith received \$1,000 teacher grant for the purchase of bands for Strength and Conditioning.

These bands will be used by all students (9th -12th) in Weights and Fitness classes to promote and provide the opportunities for students to learn proper warm-up, cool down and technique strategies.

The object is for every student to perform all core lift techniques correctly. All students will perform a proper warm-up and cool down with the use of these bands. There is a check list to make sure this will be happening.

"I love the magic," she said about Harry Potter. "In the beginning, he didn't realize the magic. It was the learning process I liked."


