

The voyage began when Behlen Mfg. Co agreed to set sail for a new adventure which began in September of 2016. It's interesting to note "setting sail" would actually involve dropping anchor close to home at the new Columbus High School.

And with that idea, Behlen Mfg. Co. set off on a journey in search for just the right anchor.

Tackle, in Los Angeles, CA possessed the anchor that would soon become known for not only providing inspiration for our Columbus High School students, but would serve to anchor the Columbus community as a whole.

BMC Transportation Partners in Progress went to work. They arranged for the pick-up of this anchor and delivery to Behlen Mfg. Co.

The anchor reached safe harbors at Behlen Mfg. Co. 10/17/16 weighing 38,000 pounds.

The sand blasting was extensive; 5 layers of paint needed to be removed to get to the anchor's steel surface. As luck would have it, May 5, 1949 was found embossed on the anchor surface for the origination of this treasure.

Now onto Duo-Lift for painting.

The architects, DLR, went to work and presented a "vision" that included mounting this anchor in front of the new high school. The idea took root and Platte Valley


Precast provided a solid foundation for the new anchor and the community symbolism it brought forth.

On 2/14/17, the anchor made the 1 mile trip, via police escort, to the new Columbus High School. The anchor was gently lifted and carefully positioned on its new "home" in front of the new High School, by Duo-Lift Mfg.

This community effort started as an idea and now it welcomes everyone that visits the new Columbus High School - Anchored in Pride!



# Saying goodbye to an old friend

When the bell rings this fall, middle school students will be in their new building.

"This allows us to move the middle school into a newly renovated high school," Superintendent Dr. Troy Loeffelholz said. "It also takes the fifth grade out of the elementary buildings, which will free up some room."

There were some changes that needed to be done. The work includes: creating new classrooms (so each teacher will have his or her own room); improving building flow; relocating guidance to the middle of the building; redoing the lights and floors in the gym and getting new goals and backboards; adding new bleachers in the north gym; turning the west balcony into a weight and exercise room; relocating the art and high needs classrooms to the old STEM area at the east end of the building; reroofing the north gym; converting the weight room into three physical education classrooms; adding three new doors for better access to the auditorium; and updating the HVAC controls in the building.

"We are not touching a majority of the building," Executive Director of Building Operations Leonard Kwapnioski said.



#### Senior Wolfe Sets Bar High

Colton Wolfe broke six school records, won three state championship titles and was state runner-up once. Wolfe won his final 114 matches as a Discoverer and lost just twice in his high school career.

"It's going to take a lot of hard work to come close to achieving what Colton did," CHS Head Wrestling Coach Adam Keiswetter said. Some of the team accomplishments with this year's seniors include: winning two district championships; one GNAC Championship; finishes of 8th, 3rd and 4th at the state tournaments; 4th place at state duals; and two other wrestlers besides Wolfe joining the 100 win club: Cyrus Marshall with 133 and Wyatt Olcott with 118.

Wolfe plans to attend UNL and continue wrestling. He wants to be a teacher and coach after college.
