Hopefully you noticed that the Alumni News has a new look! It is now a joint production of the Columbus Public Schools Alumni Association and the Columbus Public Schools Foundation. The new name, "The Anchor," is in recognition of all those who have been students in the Columbus Public Schools as well as those who support the district in a variety of ways. One definition of an "anchor" is "a person who provides strength and support" – what better term could describe the alumni and patrons of the Columbus Public School District!

For 26 years, the Alumni Association has been printing and mailing over 11,000 copies of the Alumni News at least twice a year. The cost to produce and mail each batch of newsletters is over \$5,000 – that is over \$10,000 per year! The Alumni Association has been able to continue this service with the financial support of the CPS Foundation. However, after a lot of thought and discussion, the Boards of the Alumni Association and Foundation have decided that these funds may be better spent towards projects that improve our schools. We recognize the importance of staying in touch with graduates and supporters of the Columbus Public Schools and will continue to print and mail a newsletter once a year, as this also allows us to update our alumni database. We will also continue to disseminate information about our alumni and school activities through digital avenues.

## Lohr learns from travels

By the age of 33, John Lohr worked or visited 40 different countries.

"I take good and bad from every country," he said. "There is a curiosity about Americans, and if you respect people when you are there and abide by their cultural norms, you will be fine."

Sometimes learning the cultural norms can be challenging.

"I go to report the first day at my job in Thailand, and my boss is telling people about me and how I'm from Kansas in the United States. When he is done, I stood up and corrected him and said I was from Nebraska. All the other workers looked down and the boss walked away after I did this."

Lohr said he learned the valuable lesson that in Asia, a person does not correct their boss in public.

"You take all these tools and put them in your tool belt and don't make that mistake again," he joked.

The 2001 CHS graduate didn't start off with the intent of heading out of the United State to work. When he first went to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, he planned on majoring in biochemistry.

After working in the field



and studying abroad in Germany for a year, he decided it wasn't the career for him.

"CHS has a very strong science program, and it really influenced me," he said about his original career choice. "Frankly, I realized I really didn't like research and numbers. Basic research is very repetitive."

Lohr switched his major to international studies and German. The opportunity arose for him to work at a resort in the Baltic Sea.

Foundation Representative Landon Wietfeld said Shevlin does an excellent job of demonstrating what the award means.

"This award is given to educators in the District who go above and beyond and dedicate each day to creating opportunities and inspiring learning," Wietfeld, said.

Nominations for Educator of the Year were accepted from CPS staff, administrators, parents, students, school-supporting organizations, and the general public. Shevlin received a \$1,000. There were 14 people nominated for the award. Lost Creek second grade teacher Sherry Thompson was the runner-up, and she received \$500. The Columbus Federal Credit Union donates the cash awards for both the Educator of the Year and the runner-up.

Other nominees were: North Park special education teacher Christine Church; North Park kindergarten teacher Alice Fraser; and CHS math teacher Peggy Meyer.

# Lassek chosen as Operations Employee of the Year

# CHS grad works on new high school

A summer internship turned into a full time job and the opportunity to build a new high school in the town he grew up in.

When Mike Medlar graduated from Columbus High School in 2011, he never imagined he would be a part of building the new high school. He said it is exciting to work on something that will be a part of his hometown for many years down the road.

"I've lived in Columbus my whole life," he said. "To build a project in Columbus was a great opportunity for me."

After high school, Medlar graduated from the University of Nebraska Kearney with a degree in construction management. He landed an internship with Hausmann Construction, which turned into a full-time job.

A high school wood working class sparked the initial interest in construction.

"(CHS woods teacher) Craig Post got me involved," Medlar said. "He was a good teacher, and I was fascinated with what construction was and what it entailed."

College helped him to decide the aspects he liked most about construction.

"There were a lot of different college courses that got me to a place where I'm ready to take on (manage-



ment) responsibility," Medlar said. "It did prepare me for what I wanted to go into."

He has been involved in both the labor and management side of construction and prefers management.

"On the management side, you get a bigger picture and stay ahead of the game," he said. "You have a whole project point of view."

He said the end product is what is important, and although the money is nice, it is not why he does the job.

"I love handing over a quality product at the end of the day and making sure the customer is happy," Medlar said. "I'm not there just for the paycheck."

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## Lohr travels the world

At the time, he was considering going back to school to get his MBA. Someone at the resort suggested he might want to consider the hospitality industry and attend a well-known school in Switzerland.

"(The year at the Switzerland school) that really opened the international door," he said.

The school required an internship, so he went to Thailand and worked a year at a five-star resort as a manager in training. Lohr said surprisingly knowing German also proved to be a plus.

"If I didn't know German, I would have never gotten the job in Thailand," he said. "Thailand is a big travel destination for people from Germany."

His next job took him to India where he was the head of guest relations and worked with Americans and Austrians because they spoke German. He reconnected with the girl he met while in college studying abroad for a year in Germany, and eventually she came to India to see what she thought of the country.

Lohr said before his girl friend, Angelika, moved to India, she needed to learn English. He said she was from Poland and spoke Polish and German, and they communicated in German.

"I sent her to the United States for three months to live with my parents to learn English," Lohr said. "My mom enrolled her in English classes at the college, and I came back to the US at the end of three months."

He said he shocked his parents by proposing in the airport when he landed in Omaha. They married and lived in India, but after she became pregnant, they decided they didn't want to raise a family there.

"We moved to Poland with no idea of what I would do for a job," he said. "The idea was to be closer to her family. I couldn't get a job because I had paper work for Poland but couldn't speak Polish, and I could speak German but didn't have paperwork for Germany. It was a rough time."

While attending a trade show, he was offered a job to promote educational and training programs with hospitality schools and five-star hotels in Europe. Lohr was later recruited to be the director of development school relations for Hosco. He said Hosco is a relatively new company that he describes as being similar to Linkedin, but for only people in the hospitality field or business.

He said his job is to encourage graduates of hospitality schools to join so hospitality employers can see who is available. Lohr said this way a graduate just has to upload their information to one spot, and it can be seen by many employers.

Lohr attributes much of his success to the education he received at CHS. He said band teacher Larry Rathbun and Ruth Schlobohum were both excellent teachers who didn't coddle him and made him try his hardest. Lohr said his speech and debate experiences also helped tremendously.

For now, Lohr said he just takes things one day at a time. "I go with the flow," he said. "I have nothing against coming back to the U.S. I'm just enjoying the ride."

Lohr and his wife have two children, Aleksander, 5 and Stefan, 3.

Lohr also recently received the Early Achiever Award from the foreign language department at UNL. This award is given to someone from each department to recognize an alumni who has demonstrated excellence in their chosen work.

Roberta Nielsen Saalfeld makes a difference in the lives of CHS students. Thanks to her generosity, 27 CHS graduates were able pursue their education after high school. Roberta has been a supporter of the Columbus Public Schools Foundation for more than 20 years.

For this generosity, she was named the 2015 Philanthropist of the Year by the Philanthropy Council. CPS Foundation Representative Landon Wietfeld said he appreciates all Roberta has done.

"We are grateful for Roberta's dedication in making these funds endowed with the Columbus Public Schools Foundation," he said. "Her gifts will help students for many years to come."

The Kramer High School graduate provides two scholarship opportunities for CHS students. The first one is the Edward M. Nielsen Sr. and Edward M. Nielsen Jr. Memorial Scholarship, created in 1997 to honor Roberta's father and brother. Both men were active in the community as well as in education. The scholarship goes to a person attending the University of Nebraska at Lincoln who will study either business or agriculture.

The second one started in 2008. The Christopher John Saalfeld Memorial Scholarship was created in memory of her son, Christopher, who graduated from CHS in 1979. He went on to receive his mechanical engineering degree from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas in 1983. The scholarship is awarded to a student with exceptional ideals in furthering his or her education in music or engineering at a Nebraska college or university.

"It's been gratifying to follow these students. One is a concert pianist, and one is pursuing banking," Roberta said of two students she kept in touch with.
