Columbus Public Schools gives its students the tools they need to succeed in life – wherever that may take them. While some alumni choose to make a life in their hometown, others go a bit father from home. The following have made a life abroad. In their own word (edited for length), they tell us about their experiences living in other countries, their favorite school memories and how CPS prepared them for their lives abroad.



Haley (Kohtz) Haas CHS Class of 2000

Haas has been living in Bolligen, Switzerland for the past 12 years. (Bolligen is about 15 minutes away from Switzerland's capital city, Bern.)

Why did you move to Switzerland? What led you there?

I was visiting a fellow Columbus grad in LA for a weekend in 2007 and I met this very cute Swiss guy! After two years of long-distance dating, we were married in Columbus and I moved to Switzerland to be with him.

What is your work and home life like in Switzerland?

We live in a refurbished farmhouse which is around 200 years old. I work at a small private school called the British School Bern where I am the year 2 teacher for 6-7-year-olds. We follow the British curriculum but our school also teaches German and French.

What do you love most about living in Switzerland?

Right now, not much. COVID is messing up a lot of things. When times are good, I know I am so fortunate to work part time as a teacher. I work mornings while my kids are at school and I can go home with them in the afternoon.

I love that we can go to the mountains for a day if we feel like it and hiking has quickly become one of my favorite pastimes. Most

Swiss hikes end with a restaurant at the end which serves French fries and beer!

What do you miss about living in the U.S.?

I miss so much, especially now that I cannot go home because of COVID. Usually, we are fortunate enough to go home to Nebraska every summer and at Christmas, but it has been more than a year since we have gone back.

After 12 years, I still miss my family and the simplicity of life in Nebraska. I also miss all the food - all the unhealthy food which has become such a treat to enjoy when we go back, like Runza, Cheetos, Pizza Hut and cream soda.

How did your time with Columbus Public Schools help prepare you to live abroad?

Sadly, I took Spanish in high school. If I had only known that I would be living in a German-speaking country, I would have taken German. That would have been so helpful. Learning German has been my biggest challenge! I live and work in English, so it has taken me too long to learn it. It is slowly coming now that my children are in the Swiss public school system.

What are your favorite memories of Columbus Public Schools?

I was on the swim team and I always had so much fun. Practices were hard, but we found ways to mess around. Swim meets were scary, but the swimming part only took minutes and the rest of the day was spent laying around and hanging out with friends. The spaghetti feeds before meets were always special and some of the friendships I made would last a life-

Why did you decide to live abroad? What led you there?

My wife, who I actually met while studying abroad in Germany is Polish. After living together in India for two years, we became pregnant and decided being close to her family in Poland would be best for raising our child. So, we moved.

While in Poland, I worked for an online company which allowed me to do my job from anywhere and although I technically lived in Poland, I spent most of my time traveling for business in Europe and Asia.

I am the director of development for Hosco (www.hosco.com) the world's largest hospitality network. Hosco brings together all of the hospitality talents, schools, employers and jobs into one online network. It's like a LinkedIn for hotel, tourism and restaurant people.

My role for the last five years has been to drive the development of our school and strategic partnerships as well as to contribute to the innovation strategy.

Barcelona is the headquarters of Hosco and I moved the entire familv there to be closer to my work from Aug. 2017 to July 2020.

What are your favorite things about living in Poland and Spain?/ What do you love most about living abroad?

To be honest, the first time I lived in Poland I did not like it. We had moved out of necessity rather than for our own interest (baby on the way) and for the first year I lived with my wife's parents which

brought its own stresses. In the following years, we got a small apartment, but as I did a huge amount of international travel for Hosco, I did not integrate much into the society.

Now, being back in Poland and having recently bought a house here, I feel more at home and am ready to better embrace the culture, language and people.

in Europe. What are the biggest differences between living in Poland compared to the U.S.?

Certainly, it is in terms of development. There is a sense of homogeneity associated with the towns and cities of the U.S.

Each has its own town center, supermarkets, gas stations, schools, parks, etc. and all are at a basic standard of quality. In Poland, in the big cities, you can find every possible modern convenience that you would in any big city in Europe or the U.S., but once you get into the smaller towns and villages, you really feel like you have traveled 30-40 years back in time.

It's for this reason that so many young people leave the small towns for opportunities in the cities.

How did your time with Columbus Public Schools help prepare you to live abroad?

I couldn't attribute the result of my international travel and life directly to my public school experience in Columbus. Certainly, it was a great education especially in the areas of the sciences where I still count Mr. Callan and the Griffiths as the best teachers I had. They really pushed me to excel and I believe that became a deep part of my character today.

I think rather growing up in Nebraska, a very safe but

somewhat iso-

lated state, drove my longing to get out and see the world. A joke I make over here is "When you are from the middle of nowhere, everything is interesting for you."

Of course, I then explain all the benefits Nebraska has as well.

The other influence or rather gateway, was foreign languages. I took German in high school which I followed up with at the University of Nebraska and am thankfully fluent in it.

What are your favorite memories of Columbus Public Schools?

Music and theater. Both taught me a lot about leadership, hard work, creativity and humility and some of the best friends I made came from my times in music and theater.

Also, the band and theater teachers, Mr. Rathbun and Ms. Schlobohm were some of the toughest, but best, teachers I had.

I'm thankful for my Nebraska upbringing, for my parents who gave me all the opportunities they could and for the mentoring, guidance and patience that all my teachers provided me during my CPS days.

CHS Class of 2005 Lescelius lives in New Zealand's capital city, Wellington. He and his wife moved there in Feb. 2016.

Why did you move there? What led you there?

Back in 2011, I spent a year in New Zealand working and traveling. I really fell in love with the country at that point and when my visa ended, I knew I wanted to re-

In 2016, my wife and I had an opportunity to move to Wellington so I could pursue further education and she could gain international work experience as a nurse. After school, I was fortunate enough to secure a government policy iob at the Minis-

for some practical-work experience before we planned to move on.

Over time, however, we decided this was our forever home and are working toward settling here permanently.

What did you love most about living in New Zealand?

This is such a difficult question! There are so many things we love - my wife and I both really enjoy the outdoors and New Zealand has some incredible landscapes (mountains, volcanoes, fjords, beaches etc.) to explore.

If had to say just one thing though, it would be the way of life. It's hard to put into words exactly, but there is a real sense of trust, amiability, and decency here that helps

to foster great work/life balance and an overall positive social/community well-being.

What is one place in New Zealand that you think your fellow alumni should visit that often gets overlooked?

Tourism is pretty big here so all spots that come to mind are already well covered by travel books, online reviews, blogs etc. If someone has the time and ability, I'd recommend they stop at a few places not on everyone's lists.

They are often small and off the beaten path with some fun or quirky thing to see that is unexpected and the people can be friendly and interested in chatting. New Zealand also has some world-famous hikes and I'd definitely recommend them, but they can get really crowded so if you're keen for an outdoor adventure and peace and solitude, you can also map out your own path through some stunning and isolated terrain.

What did you miss about living in Nebraska and the U.S.?

Not being able to see family with relative ease is probably the number one thing. New Zealand is quite expensive to travel to/from and so we have to alternate years between traveling and vising family in the States.

The thing I miss most about living in Nebraska are hot summer nights and thunderstorms.

Wellington's climate is mild in general (upper 30s in winter and lower 70s in summer) and it cools off quite a bit in the summer evenings.

Though it tends to be very windy and can have heavy rains, there is hardly ever lightning (once

every few years or so). I miss being able to take a walk in the evening in shorts and T-shirt, feel warm summer rain. and the power and sometimes intimidation of a sudden and torrential storm

What are the biggest differences between living in New Zealand compared to the U.S.?

When we first arrived some of the obvious differences related to day-to-day life such as driving (on left side of the road), units of measure (metric),

some spelling differences (e.g. colour, realise, metre), different names for things (e.g. plaster = band aid, biscuit = cookies, togs = swimsuit, stuffed = tired (or full as well), jam = jelly, jelly = jello, iceblock = popsicle, lollies = candy) public health care, sales tax included in the price of things (so what you see on a price tag is what you pay), no tipping, higher cost of goods.

These things are surface-level differences, but it wasn't until after we lived here a couple of years that we really started to notice the deeper cultural differences. This is a simplistic example, but the U.S. tends to stress individual achievement and competition (e.g. 'be the best, 'have the best') more than New Zealand which focuses more on maintaining social harmony (e.g. being a 'tall poppy' - roughly someone who tries to be better than others - is frowned upon).

How did your time with Columbus Public Schools help prepare you to live abroad?

The one thing that stands out in my mind was Mrs. Velasco's upper-level Spanish courses. Learning another language was nice, but I think the main thing I really appreciated was studying under someone who had made the transition herself. I think before that point, living outside the U.S. was more of a dream, but hearing about her experiences really planted the seed that living in another country was something that I could do as well.

What are your favorite memories of Columbus Public Schools?

Definitely elementary school. No bills or responsibilities and I spent all day learning new things and playing in recess and P.E. Beyond this, I really do appreciate the wide array of experience and activities available to me. both the academic (e.g. psychology, anatomy and physiology) and extracurricular (e.g. tennis, track, soccer, Destination Imagination).

What would you tell current CPS students who may be interested in living and working outside of the **United States?**

I would absolutely encourage it. There are some downsides to living overseas and the adjustment can be difficult, especially if the culture is quite different, but the positives far outweigh the negatives. For me, the most valuable thing that comes from living and working in a different country is the chance to see things from a different perspective. It's really an enriching and humbling experience and helped shape some of my views, beliefs and assumptions about life and the world.

CPS Foundation new scholarships focused on teachers, paraeducators

CPS is proud to announce two new scholarships that have been made possible by former Columbus

gh School math teacher Judy Temme, known to many as Mrs. Owens.

Mrs. Temme was a beloved Columbus High School math teacher for 34 years. She was a lifelong learner who spent four summers in Greeley, Co where she earned a master's degree in Math-

ematics at Colorado State. She spent an additional two summers of learning at the University of Wyoming and one at the University of Kansas. Mrs. Temme always wore her maroon proudly and believed in the mission of Columbus Public Schools.

Upon her passing this past June, the CPS Foundation received a surprising phone call that we were the beneficiary of a retirement account, leaving the foundation just over \$43,000.

The CPS Foundation has set up a trust account in Mrs. Temme's name to provide an annual scholarship for one teacher and one paraeducator to continue their lifelong learning.
