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Voters approve new high school

On behalf of CPS, thank you to those who worked tirelessly on this bond campaign and the entire community for investing in our students, teachers and community well into the future. For more than two years, the district has been seeking voters' permission for what they would support. We have asked the community several times for a solution. The solution that was voted on is one that was supported by 60 percent of those who voted.

Now the work will begin. With the approval of the \$49.9 million bond issue, plans must be started on the design of the new high school at the Discoverer Addition located on 33rd Avenue between 38th Street and the Lost Creek Parkway. A timeline is being developed to hire a Construction Manager at Risk firm to carry out this project. We plan on having that group on board by the July board meeting. Other important dates for a projected timeline include:

- Schematic Design June 1 July 31 School Board Review & Approval - August 1 - 14
- Design Development August 15 September 3 School Board Review & Approval – October 1 - 15
- Construction Documents October 16 Jan. 28, 2015 School Board Review & Approval - February 1 - 15
- Bidding January 30 February 26th, 2015
- Construction Begins March 2015
- Construction Complete Fall 2016

The goal of the project is to send out a bid package for site dirt work in August. The district would like to be moving dirt for a building pad by November if the project is to remain on its timetable. With a good fall and spring, our best hope is construction will begin in the spring of 2015. The new high school

could be open by the fall of 2016.

The school district has been given a guaranteed maximum price for constructing the building from the architect. The administration and board visited two high schools, Elkhorn South and Aberdeen High School in Aberdeen, SD. Next, teaching staff and administration will go to Ankeny, IA and to Elkhorn South to look at their facilities and programs to see how closely they match up to what CPS has to offer.

We are doing this as part of the project to reduce the cost of architectural fees. It is determined that the district could save up to \$1.5 million in those fees by using a site-adapt model of design.

Next comes the fun part for our staff. They get to have input and tweaking privileges with the design that works best for students. The building is anticipated to be 260,000 square feet, which will accommodate 1,400 students. Past enrollment numbers would indicate that this building will handle student growth for the next two to three decades. The design is enough for all teaching staff to have their own room with the flexibility of nine additional classrooms.

The new building will also allow for the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) program to be expanded. The district has been applying for grant dollars to help fund the creation of a STEM Academy. This program will focus on promoting careers in the science, technology, engineering and math fields through programs such as robotics, electronics and mechatronics, engineering, automotive, construction, and manufacturing.

We have been creating strong community partnerships that we hope will assist us in the design of the facility as well as help with procuring equipment for the students.

The new high school will include a 750 seat auditorium and

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Percussion ensemble takes top prize

Talent, skill, perseverance and dedication describe the CHS Winter Percussion Ensemble.

The ensemble entered the Heartland Winter Arts Alliance Championship seeded third and finished in first place. CHS competes in the Scholastic Marching category with units from Thomas Jefferson High School, Creston, Glenwood, Sioux City West, Norris, Beatrice, Omaha South and Millard North.

"We ended up changing our entire uniform," CHS senior Sam Beisner said about the difference from the final performance and others throughout the year.

Senior Cameron Pospisil agreed.

"The uniform we had before didn't fit with our show," he said. In four other performances, Creston High School in Creston IA took home first place but not this time.

Director Jeff Peabody said they learned from the other four years of competing at the competition that the show needs to make a connection with the audience.

"This year the show is about phobias," Peabody said. "The visual design we were doing didn't work. It took a long time to figure out how to communicate that to the audience."

By adding the shiny masks for the battery and morph mask, based on the character Slender, for the front of the ensemble the visual became clear.

The students have learned a lot from this year's competition.

"Although winning the championship felt great, these students learned more about cooperation and putting the needs of the group ahead of themselves," he said. "They have been true examples of the Discoverer Way as they strove to find something greater than themselves."

CHS started the Winter Percussion Ensemble four years ago. Peabody said the first year they had no idea what they were doing but, they did take first in the HWAA Championship.

Peabody said the percussion ensemble was started as a school enrichment program for band. He said in 2011, he had no intention of competing in the HWAA Championship.

He said the group was more like a club then a school activity, so there is no funding to compete. Peabody told the kids they would have to cover the cost to compete on their own and they did.

Next, they needed to find a tarp and some music to perform. A person from Bellevue offered to help write the drill for the performance. Peabody also held practices at weird hours like early in the morning or late at night.

"I didn't want to do it that first year," he said. "I made it as difficult as possible."

Peabody said he is still not sure how they won that first year. Several of the seniors were in the ensemble when they won in 2011.

"We just came in and gave it our best shot," senior Brynton Loeffelholz said about the first year. "Everyone has gotten a lot better (in the past three years)."

Students must audition for a spot every year, and many often change what they play.

Senior Brandon Perkins started off playing the trumpet in the band and switched to drums.

"I like the challenge," he said about the enjoyment he gets from playing the drums.

Since the ensemble is for those who want to participate, they give their all, Peabody said.

"They work very hard," he said. "We don't just go out there and bang around on the drums. They want to prove it takes talent and skills. A lot of people come in and say they play the drums, but they are not percussionists. These people are percussionists."

Senior Garrett Hahn said he tried out because he enjoys playing and being around his friends.

Pospisil agreed.

1,800 seat gym that could be expanded to 2,500.

There will also be 1,000 parking spaces as well as a track and practices fields.

Once the new high school is finished, the middle school students will move into the current high school. Fifth grade students will also move up to the middle school once the configurations are in place for their attendance. Fifth and sixth grade middle school students will be housed on the first floor in small learning communities. The seventh and eighth will occupy classroom spaces on the second floor.

This transition will be a 3-year plan to make the high school more program ready for middle school education. There will not need to be any immediate remodeling done to the high school in order for middle school students to move in. The district is currently working on a timetable of projects once the new high school is completed.

Along with the move of fifth graders to the middle school, the district will be freeing up 13-15 classrooms at the elementary level to help alleviate growing attendance issues.

The 1965-1989 additions of the current middle school will house the preschool program, which will also increase from four classrooms to eight and eventually, the administrative offices.

Haefner was chosen as the 2014 Columbus Public Schools Educator of the Year.

Nominations praised his dedication to his students and his expertise in the field of automotives. "When you walk into his room, you find all of the students are engaged. He has taken students that have never performed maintenance on a vehicle and provided them with the tools for success."


In recognition of this honor, he received an engraved desk set from the Columbus Public Schools Foundation and \$1,000, sponsored by the Columbus United Federal Credit Union. Haefner will also be featured on the CPS Wall of Fame and will represent CPS in the contest for the Nebraska Department of Education's 2015 Teacher of the Year.

"He has single-handedly developed one of the best automotive programs in the nation, rivaled only by trade schools whose sole purpose is to teach automotives to their high school students." Year after year, CHS earns the right to compete in the state finals of the Ford AAA Student Auto Skills Challenge. They have won many championship titles and represented Nebraska at the national contest.

An employee with CPS since 1989, Haefner earned his Master's Degree in Industrial Education in 1991 from Fort Hays State University. His students' success has led to the local Ford dealership sponsoring a brand new car each year for the students to practice and earned him an invitation to the NASCAR Technical Institute twice. The reputation of the program he developed has also led to equipment donations including three wheel alignment systems. His students have had the opportunity to build a replica Cobra, which Shell Valley Classic Wheels took back when the students finished it, showing the company's trust in his abilities.

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

Haefner also incorporates life lessons into his classes. He has not only taught his students the basics of how vehicles work and how to perform basic maintenance, but has also taught them how to buy a vehicle and how dealerships and repair shops work. He teaches them how to diagnose and fix problems.

Haefner's talents go far beyond teaching. When looking for a replacement textbook for his consumer automotives class, he became impatient because of delays with a new book and started writing his own curriculum. He submitted a sample chapter and was offered a contract to write the new textbook. In total, he has written four books for automotive technology, one of which has been translated into Chinese and is being sold overseas. On top of this, he holds a patent for the Relay Puller, an automotive tool, and is working on a patent for a second tool used in the diagnosis of electrical wiring in an automobile.

Nominations were accepted from staff, administrators, parents, and students. Forty-two teachers in the district were considered for the award. Sherry Thompson, 2nd grade teacher at Lost Creek Elementary, was the runner-up and received \$500, also sponsored by the Columbus United Federal Credit Union.

This positive impact not only provides hands on learning for the students, but also exposes them to the benefits of being a good citizen, assisting others when they need help, and making the world a better place in which to live.
